

Palmetto Goodwill changes lives! Thanks to your continued support we will ensure that every member of our community has equitable access to training, education, and employment. 2023 kicked off our new community impact plan — a plan that will take us to our 50th anniversary of serving individuals in our community. This seven-year plan is built upon three pillars: invest in our communities, grow our own, and sustain our future. These pillars underpin our vision, mission, culture, and values, mapping our future state so we never lose track of our north star of ensuring that every person in our community has the opportunity to thrive.

We reimagined education in our state when we opened South Carolina's first no-cost-to-the-student, adult charter high school in August 2023. The Palmetto Excel Center's holistic approach includes built-in support to address barriers unique to this student group. Support services include on-site childcare, career



and life coaching, and transportation assistance. We also expanded our I-CAN program, widening the pathway to prosperity and competitive employment for community members with justice-involved backgrounds. And we are proud of our continued role in the state as a leading employer of individuals with disabilities.

As you look through our report, remember that it's not just about numbers — each one of those numbers represents a person who came to Palmetto Goodwill looking for a hand-up, not a hand-out. # Lydia Brown Graduate of the Year

As a single mom of two young daughters, Lydia worked paycheck-topaycheck but knew she wanted to provide more for her young family.

She needed a new career, but she wasn't sure what she was meant to do or how to get started.

Her parents worked in manufacturing and struggled financially, but they always inspired Lydia to seek a path forward. "My parents always encouraged us to pursue our dreams and goals and to go after our passions," she explained.

When her parents both fell ill, Lydia stepped in. Witnessing her father receive hospice care and caring for her mother throughout a lung cancer battle, Lydia realized her passion and purpose in life was caring for others.

As a referral through the SNAP 2 Work program, Lydia came to Palmetto Goodwill seeking assistance in achieving her goal of becoming a certified nursing assistant (CNA). With the help of Palmetto Goodwill, she completed her CNA training and earned the highest grade in her class.

Lydia is now a team member at Somerby Assisted Living, where she was recently honored as Employee of the Month. She provides financially for her family and set a new goal to WATCH FULL STORY become a licensed practical nurse within the next five years.

### **Candace Hartley** Achiever of the Year

Within six months, Candace Hartley had left her 25-year marriage and grieved the deaths of her youngest brother and her father. Understandably, she was struggling with depression and her selfconfidence, and she describes this period as the lowest, darkest point of her life

She wanted to rejoin the workforce but finding the strength or a path seemed overwhelming. Fast-forward two years and Candace was hired by Palmetto Goodwill into a food service position at the Naval Weapons Station. It didn't take long before her potential and attitude were noticed and she was selected for a position in the busy mailroom at Joint Base Charleston. In this role, Candace has not only excelled, but she has also regained her confidence through daily interactions with customers and team members.

In addition to her role at Joint Base Charleston, Candace is a national SourceAmerica Speakers Bureau member. She now shares her story with myriad audiences, including all staff members from the South Carolina Senate and congressional offices throughout the 18 counties Palmetto Goodwill serves. She has become a passionate advocate for people with disabilities and enjoys the opportunity to be a voice for others.

Candace credits Palmetto Goodwill's support network and training for her overall growth and explains, "Since coming to Palmetto Goodwill, I feel I can accomplish anything I set my mind to." She attributes the assistance she received as the catalyst for helping her restore herself as a person.

### **Kendrick Raley** Goodwill Works!

Kendrick always knew his path to independence would look different than those around him. He was born with retinopathy of prematurity a relatively rare condition seen in premature infants. The condition led to Kendrick braving eye surgeries from an early age in a fight to combat severe visual impairment and sometimes left him feeling isolated.

That feeling began to change one summer when Kendrick first visited Camp Leo, a summer camp in South Carolina for visually impaired children. At camp he discovered an unmistakable sense of belonging, and his confidence to take on life's challenges began to grow.

In 2018, life served up a challenge Kendrick was not expecting: he was let go from his steady job of 13 years. His primary concern was how he would provide for his young son. Kendrick recalls, "To get back out there and try to start over and try to make people accept you for the disability you have is not something you really want to do, but something you have to do."

Feeling at a low and challenged to keep his independence, Kendrick tapped into his reslience and determination. He took a bold step in a new direction when he connected with Palmetto Goodwill for employment assistance. Armed with his career navigator, a revamped resume, and training, Kendrick applied for multiple jobs – but it was hard for some employers to see him as the man he is beyond his visual impairment.

Kendrick ultimately discovered meaningful employment at Charleston's Naval Weapons Station in a role that allows him to provide for his son. Life has come full circle, and he still attends Camp Leo – only now as a camp counselor. For Kendrick, the reward of sharing his knowledge and lessons on resilience is priceless.


